

## Findings or Deposition Testimony that Humphreys and Nice Failed to Follow PPB Training and/or Violated PPB Policy

<u>Issue</u>	<u>Findings or Deposition Testimony</u>
<b>Humphreys’ Foot Pursuit &amp; Takedown</b>	<p>PPB Training Division (10/2007 report) – “Initiating the foot pursuit <i>and</i> deploying the knock-down technique, based on the information contained in the case file, is inconsistent with the Training Division’s Tactical Doctrine.”</p> <p>PPB Asst. Chief Berg (9/2008 memo) – “I find the use of the knock down technique to be inconsistent with training and out of policy.”</p>
<b>Humphreys’ Tackle</b>	PPB Lt. Famous (10/2008 depo testimony, p 51) – “Officers are trained...when they're in foot pursuit ... they're trained to push the person down, not to tackle.”
<b>Humphreys’ and/or Nice’s Kick(s) to Head</b>	PPB Sgt. Livingston (8/2008 depo testimony, pp 18-19) – “A kick [or knee] to the head ... would be considered deadly force, so the situation would have to justify the use of deadly force in order to kick somebody in the head”
<b>Inadequate Disclosures to Paramedics at NW 13<sup>th</sup> by Humphreys &amp; Nice</b>	<p>PPB Commander Foxworth (3/2008 depo testimony, p 83) &amp; PPB Sgt. Gonzalez (3/2008 depo testimony, pp 37-40) An officer had an obligation under the PPB directives and policy statements to tell emergency medical personnel: (a) about the type of force that had been used on a person in their custody; and (b) about their observations of significant medical problems someone in their custody was having.</p> <p>PPB Chief Sizer and City Commissioner Saltzman (2/2010 discipline memos) “You knew Mr. Chasse had been in a prolonged struggle, hd passed out or stopped breathing, and that he had been tased. (“[Nice] believed that Officer Humphreys had landed on Mr. Chasse.”) These are important facts that should have been communicated to medical personnel.”</p>
<b>Humphreys &amp; Nice Did Not Allow or Require Chasse to be Transported to Hospital from NW 13<sup>th</sup></b>	PPB Chief Sizer and City Commissioner Saltzman (2/2010 discipline memos) “Chasse had mental health issues and both you and medical personnel believed he may have been under the influence of drugs....This is precisely the type of incident for which the transport requirements in [PPB Policy Directive] 1051.00 were written....you should have made sure Chasse was transported to the hospital....You should have recognized that...Chasse exhibited conditions and behaviors that required medical transport.
